NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED-

- Purchase of Lot 2, Block 27, USS 1430-Brian Templin said he was looking for direction from the council to start the formal process of purchasing the property or not. This property, which belongs to First Bank, could provide 3-5 parking spaces in the downtown area. There was discussion as to whether the city would consider purchasing it, or not. Jon Bolling stated the city does plan on replacing the downtown pump station. The design work for the pump station has not been done yet. Jon mentioned that there was a fuel oil tank buried on the western portion of that property. There was discussion; no action was taken.
- Consider approval of stairway for Prince of Wales Health Care Center-Jon Bolling reported the tenants at the Prince of Wales Health Care Center would like a stairway added to the building site. There is a fair amount of traffic between the first and second floors. They would like the stairway to be installed on the north end of the building. Jon stated if the city was to install the stairway, it would most likely cost the city more than its one-third share under the city's current proposal with ANTHC and the Denali Commission, who each would provide their one-third share to this project. If the council decides there is a need, they should direct staff to work with ANTHC to install the stairway at one-third the cost.

Jon added that staff at the Prince of Wales Health Care Center would like to replace the north door in the PeaceHealth section of the building and install a wider door to accommodate movement of an ambulance gurney in and out of the building.

Jon stated these two projects would not draw from the City of Craig general fund money. The projects will be funded through Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium and the Denali Commission. The city is responsible to fund \$36,300 of this project.

PIERCE/YOUNG:

moved to appropriate \$36,300 toward the construction of an exterior stairway at the Prince of Wales Health Clinic and to appropriate an additional \$3,120 for the wider door at the north end for the gurney. MOTION CARRIED

• Harbormaster's recommendations for changes to live-aboard fees-Jon asked the council if they wanted to consider an ordinance to the Craig Municipal Code that would remove the 15-day per month policy for the live-aboard fee. Currently the code says if you're on board the boat 15 days or more in a month, you're subject to the live-aboard fee.

Another issue the harbormaster deals with are the pets that the live-aboards have. The harbor staff spends some of their time dealing with pet waste on the docks. Daniel Nelson, the harbormaster, would like to establish a live-aboard fee for pets at the harbors. The council was in agreement with bringing an ordinance before the council at the next meeting with changes regarding the live-aboard policy.

 - A. A person living aboard his/her own or another person's vessel [for 15 days within any 30-day period] is considered a live-aboard for purposes of this title.
 - B. Pets may be kept on a live-aboard vessel at the discretion of the harbormaster.

1. Roadless Rule Litigation

I participated in a teleconference on September 21, 2011 with the attorneys handling this case, and with about twelve of the seventeen intervenors, of which the City of Craig is one. The purpose of the teleconference was to receive an update from the attorneys on the progress of the case.

In short, the State of Alaska filed in Washington DC Federal District Court an action against the Department of Agriculture and the US Forest Service to have the roadless rule repealed. The City of Craig and sixteen other parties have petitioned the court to join the action as intervenors, supporting the State of Alaska. Our petition to the court to join as intervenors is not opposed by the Federal Government. The Federal District Court in Washington DC has not ruled on our petition to intervene. The attorneys for the intervenors feel that the court is likely to approve the petition for intervention.

The court recently denied a motion from the Federal Government to move the case from Federal District Court in Washington DC to a court in the Ninth Circuit. Our group opposed the motion to move the venue of the case.

2. New Curb at POW Health Care Center

I sent out requests for bids to several contractors to demolish the existing curb and pour new curb where the access road to the POW Health Care Center meets the separated path that parallels the Craig-Klawock Highway. Bids for the work are due next week. The council had asked staff some time ago to arrange for a new curb at the site after a bicycle accident there in 2010.

3. Wood Drying Equipment

Negotiations are ongoing for a draft lease with Viking Lumber Co. for operation of the proposed wood drying equipment. I hope to have this process complete by the first week of October and then send the draft the staff at the Alaska Energy Authority, and to the small mill operators who attended the recent Craig city council meeting where the council authorized city staff to begin lease negotiations.

I continue to believe that this project can result in great benefits for Craig and Prince of Wales Island, and look forward to bringing a final draft of the lease to the council at its October 20 meeting.

4. Wind Data at FAA Camera Web Site

I have collected several letters of support for installing automated wind and other weather data-collecting equipment here in Craig for use by aircraft and boats. I plan to submit a request soon to the National Weather Service for this equipment.

5. POW Vocational/Technical Facility

As the council will recall, in 2010 the State of Alaska sold general obligation bonds for a number of capital projects around the State of Alaska. One of the projects funded by the bond is \$3.2 million for a POW vocational technical center, intended to provide a facility to improve vocational education. Per statute, the funding will be channeled through the City of Klawock.

The POW Voc. Tech. Center steering committee continues to meet regularly to work toward construction of the proposed secondary and postsecondary facility. The committee recently heard a report from Mr. Jeff Selvey, who talked about his experience starting up a similar program in Northwest Alaska a number of years ago. Mr. Selvey also talked about the Alaska Regional Training Center program and how the POW project might fit into that program. The advisory committee has established three subcommittees to work on tasks specific to the project: a building design committee; a partnership committee; and a management plan committee.

The group has much still to do, including completing a number of tasks that meet the timeline imposed by the State of Alaska to expend the funding set aside for the project, about \$800,000 of which must be expended by December.

6. Public Works Director Recruitment

After a long period of receiving few applications from qualified candidates, the city received a rush of applications recently, some of which are from applicants with appealing backgrounds. Staff has interviewed seven candidates in the past two weeks. I hope to narrow the list of candidates to two or three by the week of October 3, conduct final interviews and work with the Mayor to make an offer to the best candidate. Current public works director Steve Tanner plans to work through March 31, 2012.

7. Sea Otter Management

I am working with city attorney Steve Silver and staff from Congressman Don Young's office, and with staff from Tlingit & Haida Central Council and the Craig Tribal Association, to line up Alaskans to testify in support of the Congressman's bill to amend the Marine Mammal Protection Act to allow trade in sea otter hides. No hearing date has been set yet.

8. Travel Schedule

I have no plans to travel off Prince of Wales Island the remainder of the calendar year.

The council approved the first reading of Ordinance 638 at the September 15, 2011 council meeting and was scheduled to hear public comment and consider final approval of the ordinance at its October 6, 2011 meeting.

CMC 16.02.050 requires that public notice of the intent to lease city property must be posted in three public places in Craig for 30 days before the public hearing and that the notice has to be published in a newspaper of general circulation once per week for three weeks. The city routinely posts notices at city hall, First Bank and the Post Office and publishes them in the Island News.

Notice for the lease was posted in the required public places on August 22^{nd} and the notice was sent to the Island News to be posted the same day. The city has not received its copies of the Island News for the last few weeks so it was just discovered that the notice had not been published. Since Island News failed to publish the notice for the last two weeks it is not possible to get the required three weeks of publication before the meeting on October 6^{th} . Staff is working with the Ketchikan Daily News to get the notice published October 3^{rd} , 10^{th} and 17^{th} so the ordinance can be considered at the meeting October 20^{th} .

Staff will use the Ketchikan Daily News for future lease or sale notices to help avoid this problem in the future.

MONTHLY PERSPECTIVES

ECONOMY & MARKETS

It was a pretty rough month for risk assets. Investors' mood soured early on as the debt ceiling debate lingered to the bitter end. Then the drama of an S&P downgrade of the U.S. credit rating to AA+ played out in the midst of data showing that economic growth has slowed to "stall speed" of around 1% or so. Concern over a "double dip" recession began making the rounds. Europe's sovereign debt crisis enveloped Spain and Italy and then spilled over to the banking system. In the background was memory of the panic of 2008 exacerbating fears. The media was on the story with ominous headlines and "breaking news." All of this led to wild trading in August and lower stock prices.

A semblance of calm returned later in the month and stock prices did bounce back a bit. Still, U.S. large cap stocks (S&P 500) lost -5.4%. Smaller stocks as measured by the S&P 600 were down -7.7%. More carnage was seen overseas. The European Stoxx 600 posted losses of -10.2% and emerging markets (Brazil, Russia, India, and China) were off -8.9%.

Both gold and Treasuries rallied strongly, but it's not inflation fears that are driving these markets. Rather the loss of confidence in the government's ability to get their hands around macroeconomic issues including jump starting sluggish economies that have deficit/debt problems. Gold gained +12.1% to end the month at \$1,827 an ounce. WTI oil lost \$7 per barrel and settled in at \$89.

The Treasury market had its biggest monthly gain since December of 2008. The yield curve flattened with two year bonds down 15bp to yield 0.2%, while long 30 year bonds fell 50bp to yield 3.6%. An initial flight to quality rally was helped along when the Federal Reserve offered to keep short rates at record lows for two years to help the economy. They reckon inflation will be tame given slack in the economy and a 9.1% unemployment rate.

Corporate bonds fared poorly. According to Bank of America (BAC) the extra yield investors demand to own corporate bonds compared to treasuries has climbed to 227 basis points, the highest level since October 2009. The financials were particularly hard hit, although BAC got a boost when Warren Buffett agreed to purchase \$5 billion of their preferred stock.

I know what you're thinking. Other than that Mrs. Lincoln, how was the play? Frankly there isn't a lot of good macroeconomic news out there. But, the markets reflect this circumstance. However just like the news surrounding Hurricane Irene we believe that this storm in the markets is passing by and investors will experience clearer skies ahead.

We've said this before, but Benjamin Graham's famous quote is worth repeating. "In the short run the stock market is voting machine. In the long run it is weighing machine." Valuation in the stock market is attractive. A price earnings ratio of around 11 means an earnings yield of 9% on the S&P 500. The dividend yield is 2.3%. The Barclays Treasury index yields 1.1%. Even 10 year Treasuries are about 2%. Investors should favor stocks over bonds.

That doesn't mean that you shouldn't own bonds in a diversified portfolio. They do provide some protection against really bad deflationary scenarios. But long term investors should tilt away from them a bit. Bond only investors should be tilting to spread product like intermediate corporate and high quality AAA rated CMBS securities. Taxable investors should look at municipals. U.S. government bonds are overvalued in our view.



Fixed income markets showed another month of strong positive returns. The FOMC noted in its statement that it "now somewhat expects а slower pace of recovery... and downside risks to the economic outlook have increased." In addition, the FOMC expects to keep low level of rates through mid-2013.

■ The risk off trade was in place as the Treasury and TIPS market rallied +2.78% and +0.82% respectively. Interest rates continue to plummet across the curve with the 10yr nominal bond leading the way decreasing 58bp.

July 2011 Bond Total Return



- Corporates were very volatile and delivered a negative excess return (vs. Treasuries). Investors continued to shy away from risk as lower rated issues underperformed those of higher quality.
- The U.S. sovereign debt downgrade had a direct effect on the Government Sponsored Entities as they were also downgraded by S&P. Agency debt and mortgage backed securities yielded negative excess returns vs. Treasuries.
- Commercial real estate investors continued to price in harsh economic news as CMBS produced a negative -1.74% absolute return.
- Despite net outflows, municipal bonds returned a positive +1.92% for the month with below average issuance.

EQUITY MARKETS

- August was an extremely difficult month, equity markets plummeted around the world as investors became concerned that the declining stock market will cause GDP to contract. Investors also continued to focus on the European sovereign debt crisis and its potential impact on the banking sector.
- These fears weighed down on already fragile investor confidence and August marked the worst month thus far in 2011 in terms of monthly performance for the S&P 500 (-5.4%). Mid (-7.1%) and small caps (-7.7%) had almost identical returns.
- Emerging market equities fell -15.1% before rebounding 6% to end the month down -8.9%. Nevertheless, emerging markets experienced their largest monthly decline since October 2008.
- The Dow Jones-UBS Commodity Index ended up +1.0% for the month. Coffee (+18.5), corn (+13.6%), and gold (+12.3%) had the strongest gains. Physical commodities such as food are favored in uncertain economic environments because of their consistent demand.
- According to data compiled by Bloomberg, the number of CEOs cutting profit forecasts fell 38% below average in August. A total of 138 companies reduced earnings forecast compared with the historical average of 221.





RE: Southeast Alaska Transportation Plan Comment Period

Attached you will find a copy of the Southeast Alaska Transportation Plan scoping report. In short, Alaska DOT/PF periodically updates the Southeast Alaska Transportation Plan. The public portion of the process begins in earnest with the publication of the attached scoping report. DOT collects comments on the scoping report and subsequently publishes a draft plan, which is also published for public comment.

The heart of the scoping document is the six proposed alternatives. One of these alternatives, Alternative 5, would greatly increase traffic through Prince of Wales Island, using the ports at Hollis and Coffman Cove. In this alternative, the Alaska Marine Highway would rely on shorter ferry runs and existing and proposed highways to shuttle passengers and freight around Southeast Alaska. Under this scenario, summer round trip traffic between Hollis and Ketchikan would increase to 21 sailings per week, up from the current seven sailings, and 14 sailings during winter months. The Coffman Cove terminal would see 14 sailings per week to Wrangell and South Mitkoff Island.

State DOT staff will hold a public meeting on the scoping document here in Craig the evening of October 12. The State is accepting comments on the scoping report until Friday, November 4.

Please take some time to review the scoping document and provide comments to me so that I can submit written comments to DOT on behalf of the City of Craig.
