ROLL CALL

Mayor Dennis Watson called the meeting to order and the roll was taken. Present were Jim See, Marge Young, Don Pierce and Mike Douville. Greg Head and Joni Kuntz were absent, excused.

CONSENT AGENDA

The consent agenda was presented; it contained the city council minutes of January 19, 2012 and the liquor license renewal application for Craig Inn and Craig Inn Liquor.

PIERCE/DOUVILLE:

moved to approve the consent agenda. MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

HEARING FROM THE PUBLIC

Mayor Watson opened the floor to the public. Chuck Haydu and Pat Tyner, board members of Prince of Wales Hatchery Association, were here regarding the Port Saint Nicholas Hatchery. The Port Saint Nicholas Hatchery has been operating off the grant funds to provide fish rearing services. Mr. Haydu stated the Hatchery has not signed a contract with the City of Craig for 2012. The P.O.W.H.A. needs about \$70,000 a year to operate the Port Saint Nicholas Facility. Mr. Haydu suggested that a contract be drawn up between the Port Saint Nicholas Hatchery, the City of Craig and City of Coffman Cove. Mr. Haydu would like to see the cities take the burden of supplying the money for the Hatchery. Previously, money was raised, (\$15,000) through sponsoring a Salmon Derby. Add to that the cost recovery of about \$35,000. These two combined help offset the cost to operate the hatchery. Steve Merritt, an Alaska Troller's Association member mentioned that the net pens at the Port Saint Nicholas Hatchery site received Net Pens from the Chinook Salmon Mitigation Fund. The City Staff will pursue funding from the next round of Chinook Salmon Mitigation grant money.

REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICIALS

MAYOR-Dennis Watson reported he has been hired as an interim administrator for the I.F.A. until one is hired. Dennis reported he will be in Ketchikan to attend a seminar hosted by the Miners Association on February 24th.

Donnis stated the I.F.A. ferry will be taken off line while it goes through the annual maintenance check. Dennis got an update on the price of fuel this week. The price has increased by 22 cents per gallon from last week. Today the cost per gallon is \$3.40.

REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICIALS CONTINUED

I.F.A. Cont.-Dennis stated he will have a resolution prepared for the next city council meeting asking the council to support the I.F.A.'s request to seek defeasance of its remaining debt to the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank Authority. Dennis commented that it cost the I.F.A. \$280,000 a year to have the M/V Prince of Wales tied to a dock in Ketchikan.

The LF.A paid over one million dollars in fuel last year.

<u>ADMINISTRATOR</u>-Jon Bolling provided a written staff report in the packet. Jon reported the city has a public works candidate scheduled to come to Craig for an interview. He is coming from Yakutat.

<u>CITY CLERK</u>-Vicki Hamilton provided a written report. Vicki announced the City of Craig is hosting a community wide potluck dinner in celebration of the city's 90th anniversary. It will be held on March 1, 2012 at the Craig Tribal Hall, with the city council meeting convening at 7:00 p.m. in the city council chambers.

<u>CITY PLANNER</u>-Brian Templin provided a written staff report in the council packet. Brian was available to answer any questions.

<u>EMS-</u>Chaundell Piburn reported Dr. Copus was in Craig to provide training for the EMS squad. There are three training sessions coming up in March. They are staying busy.

HARBORMASTER-Daniel Nelson provided a written staff report and added the construction on the expansion of the Ice House will commence on February 27th. Daniel reported he has made arrangements for three boats to be removed from the boat yard. Daniel plans on bringing in some gravel to the boat yard to help with the sloping and to accommodate more vessels. Daniel has ordered some breakers for the main panel at the North Cove Harbor. All lights have been changed out in both North Cove and South Cove.

LIBRARIAN-Amy Marshall reported the launch of the OWL (Online with Libraries) Project went well this evening. Forty people showed up for the event. The remodeling of the Craig Public Library is finished and looks great.

<u>POLICE CHIEF-R.J.</u> Ely submitted a written report. Chief Ely reported the Craig Police Department is working toward authorization to provide fingerprinting service for CDL/HZM certification, here in Craig.

TREASURER-Joyce Mason reported one of the two loans on the seafood processing building is paid off. Petro Marine Loan has been down to all but the \$85,000. It will be paid off this year. The wood boiler loan has been paid down, all but \$160,000 which will be paid by another funding source. The Ward Cove property loan has been paid down, all but \$330,000. Joyce reported she has completed the necessary paper work for H.U.D. to apply for grant money to go toward the Ward Cove property loan. Joyce talked about P.E.R.S. and the debt the city has with them in regards to the past Craig Clinic employees. Joyce asked the council members for volunteers, as she is preparing to start the budget cycle next week. Joyce stated she will be on vacation February 29-March 12th. Don Pierce and Jim See volunteered to serve on the Budget Committee.

REPORTS FROM CITY OFFICIALS CONTINUED-

PARKS AND RECREATION-Victoria Merritt invited everyone to the City of Craig's 90th Anniversary community potluck. It will be held on March 1, 2012 at the Craig Tribal Hall at 5:00 p.m. Victoria reported the city gym floors are going to be cleaned and treated. The gym will be closed from March 12-20th. Victoria will be organizing a Spring Carnival in efforts to raise money for Craig's 4th of July celebration. The Parks and Recs budget meeting is scheduled for Friday. March 2nd.

Dear Jon and Vickie:

We completed the fieldwork and overall trending for the 2012 assessment roll in late February. Our sales for the 2012 tax roll that occurred in 2011, indicate that our assessed values for both residential and commercial properties were fairly close after consideration of recent improvements or changes. We were able to confirm seven house sales which did not give significant indication that residential assessment values should change. There were two waterfront sales with relatively strong values, so we will monitor waterfront transactions closely for the next year or so. We did not adjust residential properties this year, after analyzing the sales. As usual, we visually inspected all of the sales to confirm where large discrepancies may be definable.

As is typical, we looked at and measured, as necessary, those properties which had building permits for additions and deletions and made appropriate corrections to the assessment roll. We also added two new subdivisions and a lotline adjustment.

Sales of mobile homes within courts showed that our mobile home assessments were also fairly close to market value. We did not make any adjustment to these after making a downward adjustment last year.

After statistical adjustments, the residential assessments are at approximately 95% of the sales prices.

The Craig City staff was very helpful as always. If there are any questions regarding the fieldwork or blue cards, please do not hesitate to call.



ECONOMY & MARKETS



Attractive equity valuations at year end, better economic data in the U.S., and action by the ECB to provide liquidity to the European banking system have been the main catalysts for the move in "risk" assets.

One of the bright spots for the U.S. economy of late has been manufacturing,

America is competitive again as a result of productivity gains and wage restraint. For example, since 1980 increases in unit labor costs in widely admired and efficient Germany have almost doubled those of the U.S.

That's true in other countries including America's northern neighbor. Over the past 10 years labor costs per unit of output have declined by -13% in the U.S. compared to an increase of +18% in Canada.

Consider these headlines from The Wall Street Journal this January:

Wages at Caterpillar plant in Illinois are less than half of a similar plant in Ontorio.

Electrolux plans to close its Quebec plant, citing the "need to maintain our competitiveness," and move to a new plant in Memphis to lower costs.

Recent Bloomberg stories confirm that the return of manufacturing to the U.S. is a global phenomenon:

Methanex, the world's biggest methanol maker, said it will dismontle a factory in Chile and reassemble it in Louisiana to take advantages of low natural gas prices.

Toyota's North American division is looking to become a big exporter as the parent company gets hit by a strong yen. "This is just the beginning of a new era of North America being a source of supply to many other parts of the world" said Toyota NA's Chief Operating Officer.

China remains a low cost producer, but even there things are changing. Cora Cola has a bottling plant in Guangzhou that accounts for about 1/3 of all Coke sales in China. The investment firm Gavekal reports that a couple of years ago Coke employed 4,000 people on the line. Now it takes only 40 technicians to run the plant as a result of automation. This is a far cry from China of the old days.

When economist and Nobel laureate Milton Friedman was on a trip in China in the 70's he noticed that workers were using shovels to dig at a major infrastructure project. "Why don't they use machinery like buildozers and backhoes?" he asked. His Chinese chaperon said that they can employ more people this way. To which Friedman replied "so to increase employment further perhaps you should get rid of the shovels and have the workers use teaspoons instead?"

These anecdotes point to powerful forces and trends at work. It can be unsertling as capitalism's creative destruction works through the global economy, destroying some jobs white creating new ones. However, short of protectionism (it never works) or some Luddite friendly law against new technologies, machines, software or robotics, the trends will continue.

If automation and robotics are the wave of the future then perhaps safety and proximity to markets (to minimize transportation costs) will become deciding factors for business location. These attributes favor the U.S. and maybe manufacturing will return although perhaps the jobs will not.

in fact, because of these labor saving technologies the structural level of unemployment may be higher than normal. Education, training, and a willingness to adapt and move are about the only real source of job security these days.

I think Americans understand the benefits of these trends despite the decreased job security. We'd rather use backhoes than teaspoons any day.



- Treasury rates rose 10 to 15 basis points (bps) across the curve from 3 to 30 years last month with the 10-year yielding 1.97%.
- Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke testified before congress noting that further easing is "data dependent" decreasing the probability of QE3 in the eyes of the market. The next FOMC meeting is March 13th.
- Concerns with Iran drove up oil and gas prices and led

investors into short Treasury Inflation Protection Securities (TIPS). Front-end real rates decreased 15 bps and the two year TIPS bond real yield finished at -1.82%.

■ The Merrill Lynch U.S. Corporate Master Index yield spread over Treasuries decreased 24 bps ending at 203 bps. According to JPM total debt outstanding for companies has reached a new decade high of \$2.4T. Investors continue to absorb any new issuance that comes to market in search for yield.

February 2012 Bond Total Return



- Investors continue to treat GSE debt (FNMA, FHLMC) as a substitute for U.S. Treasuries. Mortgages continue to get a bid from the Fed to the tune of \$20-308 a week. The GSE's regulator (FHFA) sent a strategic plan to Congress reiterating their goal to "gradually contract the Enterprises' dominant presence in the marketplace...and shrink their operations."
- The investment grade CMBS index led fixed income producing a +1.16% return. The risk on trade was apparent as lower quality tranches led the way.
- The 7-year municipal index produced a small return of a +0.11%. Inflows into Municipal bond funds have finally started to slow. Pressure on municipals will start to increase next month as issuance of muni bonds begins to ramp up.

EQUITY MARKETS

- The S&P 500 continued its climb in February (+4.3%) and is up +9.0% YTD. S&P reports that it is the index's best start since 1987. AAPL (+18.8% MTD) was the biggest contributor to index performance as its market value surpassed \$500 billion on the last trading day of the month.
- Developed international equities (EAFE) outpaced large U.S. equities by over +1%. Notably, the Yen lost -5.9% to the dollar, reducing regional returns in USD to +5.1% vs. +11.5% in local currency. Japan is approximately 21% of the index.
- Emerging markets continued to show strong performance gaining +6.0%. The asset class has rallied nearly +30.0% since the October 4th lows and +17.8% YTD. As oil prices jumped more than \$12/bbi, energy intensive countries produced the strongest regional returns. Russia gained +9.6%, bringing its YTD returns to +25.8%. Emerging markets continue to look attractive, with forward P/E's trading at a 17% discount to developed markets.
- After gaining over +11% in the previous two months, REITs lost -1.1%. The sector has gained over -190% off of its March 2009 lows, but is still -40% off its February 2007 peak. According to Morningstar, recent outstanding performance is not a result of fantastic fundamental growth, but merely the recovery of a sector that was priced for bankruptcy.
- The DJ-UBS commodity index was up +2.7% as encouraging signs in the economy lifted expectations for commodity demand. Brent crude (+10.0%) was the best performer while orange Juice (-8.6%) was the largest detractor.

RE: Street Paving Update - Phase IU.

In December the council authorized staff to contract with R&M Engineering to complete paving designs for First Street, Codar Street, Fifth Street, Main Street, Second Street, Sixth Street, Spruce Street, Ninth Street, Cove Street, Eighth Street, Third Street, Sumnyside Drive, and Fourth Street. That work is now nearly complete, and those streets ought to be ready for bid by month's end.

At its March 1 meeting the council authorized adding Front Street to the scope of work, as well as replacement of the water main in Third Street between Main and Spruce Streets. In addition, Steve Tanner's inspection of the storm water system in Third Street, between Spruce Street and Water Street, reveals that the system is deteriorated to the point where Steve recommends against paving over the system. In response, R&M Engineering now has a design to replace the existing storm drain system as part of the scope of work of the paving project. This work will require some changes to how the storm water eventually reaches the outlet on the water side of Front Street.

R&M staff will met with city staff on Friday, March 9 for several hours to finalize the drawings. A final set of drawings for bidders will be ready this month, with the bidding process to follow. They scope of work for the project includes adjustments to manhole and gate valve elevations, areas requiring subexcavation where the quality of the subsurface material in our city streets is particularly poor, installation of drainage structures, including valley gutter and storm drain catch basins, and other improvements. Attached is a preliminary cost estimate for the design work. The project engineer estimates the cost of installing the designed improvements at about \$2.2 million, including a ten percent contingency amount. That estimated cost is likely to increase slightly when the final drawings are complete.

I plan to deliver a set of drawings to the council in an April council packet. I can also have a representative from R&M Engineering attend a city council meeting or call in to answer any council questions on the proposed design drawings.

There will be at least two asphalt contractors on POW this year. Southeast Road Builders has its Klawock plant here for at least part of the summer, when it will complete the next 1.5 miles of paving on the Port St. Nicholas Road. In addition, the State of Alaska will likely award a contract soon for work on the Klawock-Hollis Highway to either Alaska Interstate Construction or to SECON, whose work will require the presence of an asphalt plant here on POW.

No council action is necessary at this point. I would be happy to answer any council questions on this subject at the council's March 15 meeting, any time between now and then.

RE: Consider Award of Street Design Services Bid

In December the council also authorized staff city staff to solicit bids for engineering services to design the remaining city streets for paving. Copies of the request for proposals and the subsequent bid addendum are attached.

The city received four proposals in response to the request for solicitation. The proposals were scored by Craig Public Works Director Steve Tanner and me. The table below summarizes the scoring results of the proposals.

The proposal from RP Kinney Associates received the highest score from both Steve Tanner and me. The company tells me they are prepared to begin work in the near future.

The scope of this work includes designing the last of the city's streets for paving, and preparing bidding documents for the paving work.

Funding for the project comes from several grant sources, including pass-through funds from the State of Alaska to the Federal Highway Administration, the Denali Commission, and from a capital projects grant from the Alaska Legislature.

The project RFP calls for the design work to be completed within 90 days of award of the contract for services, meaning that the work should be completed by about June 30. At that point staff should know the balance of funding available for the subsequent paving of the designed city streets, and how best to proceed with bidding out the next round of paving.

The proposals staff received from the four bidders are available for council review. Please contact me if any of you would like to read the proposals and I will forward copies to you.

Recommendation.

That the council award the bid for street design services to RP Kinney Associates in an amount not to exceed \$47,373.

RE: POW Hatchery Association Request for Support

At its March 1 meeting, representatives from the POW Hatchery Association asked the council to consider ongoing financial support for POWHA's Port St. Nicholas king salmon hatchery. Below is a history of the PSN king salmon project, followed by a request from staff for council direction on POWHA's funding request.

Background

POWIIA operates the Port St. Nicholas king salmon facility. The facility, located on city- owned property next to the city's water treatment plant at 5.5 mile of the PSN Road, raises king salmon from eggs to smolts. The smolts are released at two locations: the Port St. Nicholas River, and at Coffman Cove. Both these release sites are classified as terminal fisheries, meaning that the king salmon that return to the release sites as adults are not allowed to spawn. Instead they are intended for 100% catch by the various gear groups. Eggs are brought in every year from other hatcheries to resupply the PSN facility. Since the project began, PSN eggs have come from the Mountain Point hatchery facility in Ketchikan. That facility is operated by the Southern Southeast Regional Aquaculture Association, whose board of directors agreed a few years ago to provide eggs to the PSN facility. The SSRAA board, however, is not obligated to provide king salmon eggs every year.

Funding for the PSN hatchery building and equipment came in part from a grant from the Sustainable Salmon Fund that Craig City Administrator Tom Briggs secured in the early 2000's. A fish enhancement project at PSN was an economic development priority for the City of Craig for many years before the project was eventually funded from the Sustainable Salmon Fund. The City of Coffman Cove also received funding from the same source to begin a terminal fishery there, using fish raised at the PSN facility. Some of the funding Coffman Cove secured has been spent on upgrades to the PSN hatchery site.

The City of Craig owns all the equipment and the hatchery building on the site. For several years the city signed an operation agreement with POWHA, where POWHA agreed to raise and release the king salmon, and city agreed to pay POWHA for the effort. Typically the city paid POWHA \$20,000 per year for the work. Over four years the city paid POWHA \$75,000 to raise the fish, funding that the City of Coffman Cove secured from the Sustainable Salmon Fund for the purpose of providing some operational support to the project. The hope was that when the \$75,000 ran out POWHA would be able to fund the operation from cost recovery: that is, from the catching and selling of the king salmon returning to PSN. POWHA did complete some cost recovery last year, and carned about \$35,000. The association is uncertain if future cost recovery efforts will earn as much revenue. The association is, however, planning a cost recovery effort again

in 2012, and has equipment for a new weir system to more efficiently harvest the returning king salmon.

Current and Future Need

To improve the return of adult king salmon to PSN, POWHA proposes to install net pens in PSN to rear smolts prior to release. Not pen rearing apparently provides for a healthier group of smolts and ultimately leads to increased adult returns, and thus better salmon catches as well as improved prospects for cost recovery. POWHA also sees the net pens as one means to ensure the raising of 400,000 chinook smolts each year at the PSN facility. This year's population is at about 320,000.

With the original \$75,000 operational funding how spent, POWHA desires a fund be established to finance the operation of the PSN facility. The board and staff at the hatchery estimate the prior year's cost to operate the facility at about \$70,000 (see attached budget summary from POWHA). Members of the POWHA board asked the council on March 1 to establish a fund to ensure annual operation of the PSN facility. Ideally the proposed fund would begin at an amount equal to one year's operation, and then grow to provide an operational margin for the PSN facility. The hatchery association would prefer to have at least the full year's requirement of \$70,000 in the fund at the time the new broodstock year eggs arrive so that they are assured funding is in place to hatch, raise, and eventually release the fish. POWHA desires an annual operation agreement between itself and the City of Craig governing responsibilities for raising king salmon. The responsibilities are similar to the agreements that POW and the city used when dispensing the \$75,000 allocation. However, POWHA staff does propose some specific tasks for it and the city, including

POWHA tasks:

- Hire, train and manage employment of a Fisheries Technician for the site; this is a full time job.
- Hire, train and manage employment of two Technicians every year, during February, for CWT
- Provide qualified personnel for hatchery maintenance and repairs, when necessary.
- Purchase all needed supplies on a yearly basis (fish food, chemicals, tools, etc.)
- Take care of accounting for PSN project.
- Obtain eyed eggs each fall, for yearly production of chinook fry (this is dependent on yearly cost to operate, roughly \$70,000, to be secured each year, no later than July !**).
- Hatch, rear, transport, and release chinook smolts each year, as outlined in Annual Management Plan with ADF&G.
- Install and maintain weir on Port Saint Nick River, and perform cost recovery
 operations. Funds generated to go into a "Fish Fund", to be used for yearly
 operating costs of project.
- Provide technical and logistical support to both Craig and Coffman Cove for duration of the project.

City of Craig tasks:

- Provide continuous supply of high pressure water for hatchery operations.
- Perform yearly maintenance on pressure reducing valves in Mechanical Room of hatchery.
- Provide electricity for the hatchery site.
- Continue to donate the \$1.00 per year for the lease to the grounds of the facility.
- Pay \$59,500 per year to a fund to support POWHA.

The S59,500 amounts to about 85 percent of the estimated annual operating costs. Because the City of Coffman Cove also benefits from the raising of king salmon at the PSN facility, POWHA proposes that Coffman Cove also contribute to the cost of raising the salmon. POWHA estimates that about 15% of the salmon are shipped to Coffman Cove for release, and the association plans to approach Coffman Cove about funding a portion of the project cost.

POWHA proposes that the city manage the operational fund, using its own general fund revenue, revenue contributed by Colfman Cove, revenue from cost recovery efforts, and any other revenue that is carmarked for the king salmon program. POWHA would regularly invoice the city for payment from the fund equal to the cost to raise king salmon each year. For example, if the fund had been in place in the past year, the \$69,297 operational costs would have been met by the \$35,000 in cost recovery, and from contributions made by the City of Craig and City of Coffman Cove.

Summary

In short, POWHA wants assurance that it can pay for the raising of each year's stock of king salmon, and continue to have a formal agreement with Craig governing management of the PSN facility. The city council should respond with direction to staff as to what extent it wants the city to participate in the king salmon program. The original hope that cost recovery efforts would pay the operational cost of the PSN facility has not materialized yet, and may never materialize. While the city can help in this effort by seeking grant funding for operation, such as from the 2012 Chinook Salmon Mitigation Fund program, a longer-term plan to fund PSN hatchery operations is needed.

Recommendation

City staff is in the middle of working on the next city fiscal year budget. If the council chooses to contribute City of Craig general fund dollars to this project it should give staff guidance on the amount of funding to designate toward the PSN facility, and how to manage the funding, such as through continuation of an operational agreement with POWHA.

RE: Appointment to SEASWA Board of Directors

As the council will recall, Craig voters approved joining the Southeast Alaska Solid Waste Authority (SEASWA) two years ago. As a formal member of the authority, the City of Craig is entitled to a seat on the SEASWA board of directors. Until recently Ms. Gail Slentz held that seat. She resigned the seat when she took a job recently with the Interisland Ferry Authority.

City staff posted the vacancy about two months ago, seeking letters of interest from the public to fill Craig's seat on the board. As of today's date the city has received no letters of interest to fill the seat. The SEASWA board continues to meet to plan for solid waste management in Southeast Alaska, and is interested in having a replacement Craig board member join them.

Given the lack of public interest, the council should appoint someone from the council or staff to represent the City of Craig on the SEASWA board. In the long term I would still like a member of the public to represent Craig. Short of that it is likely that a city staff member will fill the seat unless the council wants one of its own in that position. Currently the other community board seats are filled by city staff. If the council wishes I can serve as the city's representative until a better choice comes along for the council to consider.

The other SEASWA communities are Klawock, Thorne Bay, Kasaan, Coffman Cove, Wrangell, and Petersburg.

Recommendation

Appoint a representative from Craig to fill the city's seat on the SEASWA board of directors.
