Mayor/IFA- Mayor Watson traveled to Anchorage for the Alaska Municipal League Conference. Mayor Watson attended the marijuana presentation and the PERS retirement discussion. The State is looking at a 3-4 billion dollar deficit. Mayor Watson will be traveling the 16th of December through the 12th of January. Jan Trojan asked about the veterans travel for IFA. Mayor Watson commented that the money is in place, but the VA is still working out procedures for veteran's travel. IFA travel is up over last year.

Administrator- Provided a written report. Jon and Brian just returned from Washington DC where they had a presentation in front of the Army Corps of Engineers Civil Works Review Board. Staff presented the small boat harbor project, which passed.

Treasurer- Absent excused.

Aquatic Manager- Provided a written report.

City Clerk- Provided a written report. Kassi also added that the next council meeting is scheduled for January 7th. Mayor Watson may be absent.

City Planner- Provided a written report. Mike Douville commented about Congressman Young's conversation with Brian regarding the observer program and new electronics used for the observer program. Brian explained that the electronic monitoring would take place instead of having a physical observer on board which would benefit the smaller fishing vessels with less room. Mike is looking for a simple solution that is cost effective, but is unsure exactly what that may be. Steve Silver is also looking into a plan C regarding the post office.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Update on State of Alaska marijuana regulations

Brian explained that the Planning Commission will be reviewing the draft ordinances for the City of Craig at the December 28th meeting. Brian did comment about two regulations that the council may consider. Jim See would like to consider opting out due to the results of the advisory vote on the ballot last October. Jim also urges the council to ban marijuana edibles from the City of Craig. Brian mentioned that the new regulations allow for marijuana consumption in marijuana retail establishments, and Jim commented that poses a problem for the police that are responsible for patrolling the establishments. Mayor Watson commented that the vote of the people on the ballot was in support of retail establishments, and the council should look at finding ways to do so. Greg Dahl would like for the council to keep the residents of PSN in mind, as they didn't have a say in the vote on the municipal ballot this year. Mayor Watson will work to draft an ordinance to go before the council regarding marijuana regulations in Craig.

CITY OF CRAIG ORDINANCE NO. 678

ADDING SECTION 5.10 TO THE CRAIG MUNICIPAL CODE PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF COMMERCIAL RETAIL SALE, COMMERCIAL CULTIVATION, COMMERCIAL MANUFACTURE AND PROCESSING, AND COMMERCIAL TESTING OF MARIJUANA AND MARIJUANA PRODUCTS, AND ESTABLISHING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION; AND ADDING SECTION 9.91 TO THE CRAIG MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBITING PRODUCTION OF MARIJUANA CONCENTRATES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CRAIG, ALASKA:

- Section 1. <u>Classification</u>. This ordinance is of a general and permanent nature and the code sections adopted hereby shall become a part of the code of the City of Craig, Alaska.
- Section 2. <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
- Section 3. <u>Effective Date.</u> This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon adoption.
- Section 4. Action. The Craig City Council finds the following:
- **WHEREAS,** Ballot Measure 2 An Act to Tax and Regulate the Production, Sale and Use of Marijuana, and codified as Alaska Statutes 17.38, providing for the legalization of marijuana, was approved by Alaska voters on November 4, 2014, and certified on November 28, 2014 by the State of Alaska, Division of Elections; and
- **WHEREAS**, Alaska Statutes 17.38 was amended by statute by the Twenty Ninth Alaska Legislature with the adoption of House Bill 123; and,
- **WHEREAS,** newly enacted AS 17.38.110(a) states "A local government may prohibit the operation of marijuana cultivation facilities, marijuana product manufacturing facilities, marijuana testing facilities, or retail marijuana stores through the enactment of an ordinance or by a voter initiative"; and,
- **WHEREAS**, newly enacted AS 17.38.110 (b) states "A local government may enact ordinances or regulations not in conflict with this chapter or with regulations enacted pursuant to this chapter, governing the time, place, manner and number of marijuana establishment operations"; and,
- **WHEREAS**, the City of Craig held a municipal election on October 6, 2015 at which Craig voters cast ballots addressing advisory questions regarding regulation of the four commercial marijuana license types created by the adoption of Ballot Measure 2; and,

- **WHEREAS**, voters advised at the October 6, 2015 municipal election that two commercial marijuana license types be prohibited in the City of Craig, and one commercial license type be permitted; and,
- **WHEREAS**, Craig voters cast an equal amount of "yes" and "no" ballots on the fourth license type; and,
- **WHEREAS**, media reports, peer reviewed studies and other research demonstrates that use of marijuana can have long-term detrimental effects on adults and youth alike; and,
- **WHEREAS**, regulations adopted by the Alaska Marijuana Control Board, with authority derived from statutory language in Ballot Measure 2, require warning labels be placed on packaging containing marijuana and marijuana products that promulgate the deleterious effects of marijuana use; and,
- **WHEREAS**, THC-bearing marijuana edibles, concentrates, and extractions pose a public health hazard meriting prohibition of their production, transport, and sale in Craig; and,
- **WHEREAS**, in adopting this ordinance, it is neither the City of Craig's intent nor desire to regulate, restrict, or prohibit licensed marijuana establishments outside the municipal boundaries of the City of Craig; and,
- **WHEREAS**, the City of Craig exercises its authority under Alaska Statutes 29.25, AS 29.35, AS 29.40, and other relevant statutes; and AS 17.38.110(a) and (b) to prohibit and regulate commercial marijuana, by adding a new section to the Craig Municipal Code, Section 05.10, as follows:
- 5.10 Marijuana Establishments
- 5.10.010 Local Regulatory Authority
- 5.10.020 Marijuana Establishments Prohibited.
- 5.10.025 Registration Required
- 5.10.030 Limits on Number of Marijuana Establishments
- 5.10.035 Hours of Operation
- 5.10.040 Identification requirement to prevent sale to person under 21
- 5.10.045 Prohibition on Sale of Marijuana Edibles, Concentrates, and Extractions
- 5.10.050 Production of Marijuana Concentrates Prohibited
- 5.10.055 Prohibition on On-Site Consumption of Marijuana
- 5.10.060 Enforcement and Inspection
- 5.10.800 Definitions
- 5.10.900 Penalties for Violation

5.10.010 Local Regulatory Authority

A. The Craig City Council shall be the local regulating authority responsible for processing applications submitted for a registration to operate a marijuana establishment within the boundaries of the local government under AS 17.38.110(c).

- B. Complete copies of applications required by the Marijuana Control Board for new licenses, license renewals, changes of ownership, and transfer of licenses shall be submitted by the license applicant to the Craig City Clerk on or before the same day that applications are submitted to the Marijuana Control Board. The City Clerk will provide for city council and city staff review of the application and comment to the Marijuana Control Board within the time limits set by the board.
- C. License applications shall be reviewed by the Craig Building Official to ensure compliance with local zoning code, distances from facilities provided for in 3 AAC 306.010(a), and related municipal ordinances. The Craig Building Official will forward comments on each application to the city clerk for city council review.
- D. License applications shall be reviewed by the Craig Police Department and comments will be sent to the city clerk for city council review.

5.10.020 Marijuana Establishments Prohibited.

Commercial marijuana cultivation, commercial marijuana manufacturing, and commercial marijuana testing facilities, as defined, licensed, or regulated by the Alaska Marijuana Control Board, are prohibited.

5.10.025 Registration Required

- A. All marijuana establishments shall be registered with the city as required by Craig Municipal Code 3.08.170, and be compliant with the Title 18 of the Craig Municipal Code. A registration may be issued only when:
 - 1. a valid license has been issued by the Alaska Marijuana Control Board; and,
 - 2. the Craig Building Official certifies that the proposed marijuana establishment complies with Title 18 of the Craig Municipal Code.

5.10.030 Limits on Number of Marijuana Establishments

A. There shall be a limit on the number of licensed retail marijuana stores located within the municipal boundaries of the City of Craig as follows:

1. No more than two licensed retail marijuana stores.

5.10.035 Hours of Operation

A licensed retail marijuana store may not conduct any business on, or allow any consumer to access, the retail marijuana store's licensed premises between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. each day.

5.10.040 Identification requirement to prevent sale to person under 21.

- A. A licensed retail marijuana store shall refuse entry into the licensed premises to any person failing to produce a form of valid photo identification showing that person is 21 years of age or older. A valid form of identification includes:
 - 1. an unexpired, unaltered passport;
 - 2. an unexpired, unaltered driver's license; instruction permit, or identification card of any state or territory of the United States, the District of Columbia, or a province of Canada;
 - 3. an identification card issued by a federal or state agency authorized to issue a driver's license or identification card.

B. A licensed retail marijuana store shall refuse to sell marijuana or a marijuana product to any person who does not produce a form of valid photo identification showing that person is 21 years of age or older.

5.10.045 Prohibition on Sale of Marijuana Edibles, Concentrates, and Other Products

No licensed retail marijuana store may sell, offer for sale, display, or possess any THC-bearing edible marijuana product, concentrate, inhalant, ointment, oil, or tincture within the city limits of Craig.

5.10.050 Production of Marijuana Concentrates Prohibited

- A. No person may produce solvent based marijuana concentrate using the hydrocarbons N-butane, isobutene, propane, or heptane or other explosive or corrosive chemicals, solvents, or gases.
- B. Any violation of this chapter is an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in Craig Municipal Code 1.16.040 for violation of 9.90.010 of the Code.
- C. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as such hereunder.
- D. In this section, "concentrate", "marijuana concentrate", and "marijuana" have the meaning given in 3 AAC 306.990.

5.10.055 Prohibition on On-Site Consumption of Marijuana

No licensed retail marijuana store shall permit consumption of marijuana or a marijuana product on the licensed premises within the city limits of Craig. A licensed retail marijuana stores is considered "public place" as the term is used at Craig Municipal Code 9.90.040.

5.10.060 Enforcement and Inspection

- A. The Code Enforcement Officer shall be responsible for ensuring compliance, including all conditions of approval applied by state and local regulatory authorities, for marijuana establishments within the municipal boundaries of the City of Craig. The Craig Police Department shall assist the city's code enforcement officer in the course of inspecting marijuana establishments, ensuring compliance with conditions of approval, and issuing citations for noncompliance of ordinances, regulations, and imposed license, zoning, and registration conditions.
- B. It is unlawful for any licensee or employee of licensee to refuse a law enforcement officer, or Code Enforcement Officer, access to and inspection of all areas of a licensed premises.

5.10.800 Definitions

In this section,

- (1) "concentrate" or "marijuana concentrate" has the meaning given in 3 AAC 306.990;
- (2) "marijuana" and "marijuana products" has the meaning given in Alaska Statutes 17.38.900;
- (3) "marijuana establishment" and "licensed premises" means a commercial marijuana retail, cultivation, product manufacturing, or testing facility licensed by the State of Alaska under AS 17.38 and 3 AAC 306.
- (4) "THC" has the meaning given in 3 AAC 306.990.

(5) "THC-bearing" means any product containing an amount equal to or greater than 0.01 milligrams of THC per gram of product, or 0.001% THC concentrate.

5.10.900 Penalties for Violation

- A. Any violation of this chapter is an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in Craig Municipal Code 1.16.040 for violation of 9.90.010 of the Code.
- B. Each day such violation is committed or permitted to continue shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as a separate offense.
- C. Each sale in violation of Craig Municipal Code 5.10.035 shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as a separate offense.

Attached you will find Ordinance No. 678. The ordinance adopts a new section into the Craig Municipal Code, Section 5.10, regulating commercial marijuana activities.

Below is a section-by-section summary of Ordinance No. 678.

Whereas clauses. The series of "Whereas" paragraphs are intended to provide context for and the authority to adopt into the city's municipal code rules governing marijuana retail establishments. One of the "Whereas" clauses references "media reports, peer reviewed studies and other research" about marijuana use. I have a growing list of cites to these reports and studies in my office, and would be happy to share them with the council.

5.10.010 Local Regulatory Authority. Identifies the Craig City Council as the local entity responsible for regulating commercial marijuana activities in Craig. New statutory language established through the approval of Ballot Measure 2 allows for a local government to establish a local regulatory authority. Designating the council as the local regulatory authority eliminates any doubt regarding the council's authority to address local commercial marijuana activities. It also makes the city eligible to receive one-half of the registration application fee that commercial marijuana establishment applicants must pay to the State of Alaska. This section also requires that any person sending a marijuana establishment license application to the State of Alaska also send a copy to the City of Craig, and provides for review of the license application by city staff and the city council.

<u>5.10.020 Marijuana Establishments Prohibited</u>. Prohibits the operation of commercial marijuana cultivation, manufacturing, and testing facilities. This section is based on the results of last fall's public advisory vote on the municipal ballot.

<u>5.10.025</u> Registration Required. Commercial operations must register with the City of Craig per CMC 3.08.170. This section requires the same action for marijuana establishments. A city registration may be issued when a proposed licensed marijuana facility is compliant with the city's zoning code and receives a state license.

<u>5.10.030 Limits on Number of Marijuana Establishments</u>. The ordinance limits the number of retail marijuana license establishments in Craig to two. Given the uncertainty about the market response to the legalization of commercial marijuana, this section provides for competition among retail commercial stores while giving the community a mechanism to respond deliberately to future demands from the industry.

- <u>5.10.035 Hours of Operation.</u> Requires retail marijuana establishments to close to the public between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 8:00 a.m. The city enforces the same regulation as to businesses that sell alcohol.
- 5.10.040 Identification requirement to prevent sale to person under 21. Requires that any person entering a retail marijuana establishment present a photo identification showing that the person is at least 21 years old. The language as to what constitutes a valid photo identification is copied from state regulation.
- 5.10.045 Prohibition on Sale of Marijuana Edibles, Concentrates, and Other Products. Prohibits the sale of certain THC-bearing marijuana products. This section does not prohibit sale of marijuana products intended for smoking or for use in food made at home. The listed products in this section may be sold in a marijuana retail store if they contain trace amounts of THC. This section does not regulate the sale of marijuana products that contain concentrations of cannabinoids other than THC.
- <u>5.10.050 Production of Marijuana Concentrates Prohibited</u>. In order to avoid explosions resulting from careless attempts to produce concentrated marijuana products using butanes and other explosive fuels, this section makes illegal the activity of using flammable/explosive hydrocarbons to produce concentrated marijuana products.
- <u>5.10.055 Prohibition on On-Site Consumption of Marijuana</u>. Prohibits on-site consumption of marijuana products, including what are commonly called "smoking clubs", whether that consumption is by smoking, eating, or another means of consumption. This section includes a reference to a an ordinance adopted by the council about a year ago, codified at CMC 9.90.040, that identifies commercial establishments as public places where marijuana consumption is prohibited.
- <u>5.10.060</u> Enforcement and Inspection. The means of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance are provided here.
- <u>5.10.800 Definitions</u>. Most of the terms defined here carry the same definitions found in Alaska Statutes and regulations regarding commercial marijuana. In defining what constitutes "THC-bearing" for the purposes of section 5.10.045, the ordinance includes measurements of THC that will apparently not cause psychoactive affects, and that can be accurately measured by a licensed marijuana testing facility.
- <u>5.10.900 Penalties for Violation</u>. Citations issued for violation of 5.10 of the CMC are tied to the existing penalty schedule already established in the city's municipal code.

The State of Alaska continues to work toward implementation of Ballot Measure 2, approved by a statewide vote in 2014. The Alaska Lt. Governor's office faces a January 24 deadline to act on draft state regulations prepared by the Alaska Marijuana Control Board (MCB). If the Lt. Governor approves those regulations, they will take effect February 24, 2016. If the regulations are sent back to the MCB then adoption of final regulations will be delayed, and any local regulations in place shall govern commercial marijuana activities.

Because Ordinance No. 678 relies in part upon the adoption of regulations proposed by the State of Alaska, the adoption of those regulations is a material issue here. The council will know the outcome of the Lt. Governor's review by Monday, January 25. That date falls between the proposed ordinance's first and second readings, which provides time for the city to respond to either the state's adoption or rejection of the draft regulations.

Recommendation

Approve Ordinance No. 678 at first reading.

The Department of Commerce has estimated the City of Craig will receive \$4,942.51. This is approximately half the amount the city received last year.

Attached you will find City of Craig Resolution 16-02. The resolution adopts Prince of Wales Community Advisory Council Resolution 16-01 which the POWCAC membership approved in November 2015.

Each year, POWCAC prioritizes island transportation projects and sets the priorities out in a resolution. The resolution, once approved, is sent to Alaska DOT/PF and other agencies, where they ostensibly use it to earmark funding for island projects. Most of the projects are from the prior year's resolution. I should note here that funding is in place to complete the Hydaburg Road resurfacing project, and the Naukati Bay Road project.

POWCAC Resolution 16-01 is similar to those adopted by the organization in prior years. The resolution retains priority projects from last year, and emphasizes the need for those projects to the incoming Walker Administration. As it has done in prior years, POWCAC unanimously agreed to focus attention on the need for an operating subsidy to the Interisland Ferry Authority, and that request is the first item called out in the resolution.

As the council will recall, POWCAC resolutions become effective only after they are approved by a majority of governing bodies of the participating communities. Craig is one of the participating POWCAC communities.

Recommendation

RE: Capital Projects Resolution

Attached you will find Resolution 16-03. The resolution identifies the city's capital project needs for 2004.

The council regularly adopts a capital projects resolution to guide lawmakers as they write capital project budgets. Listing out city priorities is useful in identifying what projects are important to Craig. It also allows legislators to match local priorities with existing or proposed funding programs.

While the state's economic woes are well known, and will likely lead to essentially a zero discretionary capital budget again this year, it is in our interest to make sure state officials in Juneau are aware of other needs here.

Resolution 16-03 is updated from the capital projects resolution that the council adopted a year ago, a copy of which is attached for your reference. I have eliminated from the proposed current year list a few items from the 2015 list, including debt relieve for POW Hatchery Association, and expansion of the POW Health Care Center. I also suggest reprioritizing some of the projects, including moving the POWER Building renovation work and library expansion higher up the priority list due to ongoing efforts to make these projects eligible for other funding.

As always, the council is free to reprioritize the list as it sees fit prior to approval.

1. Craig Child Care Center Closure

The Craig Child Care Center is currently closed. I am told that there are problems with staff securing state licenses needed to work at the center. Other problems may exist as well.

Some background information for the council is probably useful here. The City of Craig owns the Craig Child Care Center building, and leases the building to the non-profit Craig Child Care Center Inc. for \$1 per year. In return the corporation is to offer child care services to the general public. Some of the corporation's clients receive a subsidy from the State of Alaska to defray some of the cost of child care that the center provides. While the corporation has existed for more than twenty years, the board of directors and staff at the facility change regularly as children age out of the facility and enter local schools, and as newborns and new families in the area and begin bringing their children to the facility.

I have a call into the state licensing division to find out more about what is happening at the facility. I also have a call into the director of the center and am waiting for a reply. I will also attempt to reach board members at the non-profit to see if there is a way that the city can help to reopen the center.

2. POWCAC Meeting

The Prince of Wales Community Advisory Council meets again on January 26 in Thorne Bay. I have yet to see an agenda but I expect the topics of discussion will include more input on the borough study, among other topics. As I reported to the council in December, Coffman Cove city administrator Misty Fitzpatrick is the POWCAC chair for 2016. Misty has already developed a web site (http://www.powcac.org/) that the public can access to find information about the borough study.

3. Craig Aquatic Center Renovation

Representatives from the projects' general Contractor, CBC Construction, were in Craig last week to take final measurements of the building in preparation for getting submittals to the architect and then ordering materials. Work still scheduled to begin in earnest on May 1.

4. Craig Cable

Craig Cable TV is in arrears to the City of Craig for tens of thousands of dollars due to lack of filing and remitting sales tax and lease payments. The city recently received an Entry of Default decision from the Craig District Court after Craig Cable failed to respond meaningfully to our prior court filings to secure payment of the debt. City staff will continue to take steps to secure judgement and ultimately payment of the amount

owed by the company. Given that Craig Cable has failed to live up to the terms of the lease it holds with the City of Craig, staff may also elect to move to cancel the lease.

5. Request for Proposals

The city currently has several RFPs posted. They include:

- a. <u>Cost recovery efforts for Port St. Nicholas king salmon</u>. This project solicits an operator to fish for hatchery king salmon returning to PSN. Funds from this effort offset the cost of operating the hatchery facility. Proposals are due January 25.
- b. <u>Community Garden Activities</u>. The POW Health Network offered a \$5,000 grant to the City of Craig to make improvements to the community garden. Last year approximately 25 beds were maintained at the garden site on Water Tower Road. The city hopes that funding from the health network will make improvements to the site, including greenhouses, upgraded beds, and other changes. Proposals are due January 21.
- c. <u>Fire Hall Annex</u>. Bids from general contractors to construct the annex building are due January 26.

6. Harbor Repairs

Staff is readying a request for design/build proposals for two projects downtown. The first is to make repairs to the City Dock. As the council may recall, a pile cap beam failed last summer, leaving a portion of the dock unsafe for vehicle traffic. The beam requires replacement in order to make the dock fully functional for the wide range of uses it is subject to. The second project is to make repairs to the old fuel dock due to damage from the Ruth Ann's fire last month. Most of the first 100' of the dock must be replaced in order to make the dock useable again for this summer's fishing season. I plan to bid these two projects together since the work for both is so similar, and in hopes of making the project big enough to attract multiple bids.

7. SPC Meeting

Staff from Seafood Producers Cooperative called recently to discuss a meeting date with city staff in January. The company would like to discuss renewing for 2016 the ice house labor agreement from last year, and again address finding a long-term facility in Craig so that the company can find a buying station other than the temporary use they make at the City Dock.

8. Craig Court

I am told that the State of Alaska will delay moving the Craig Court to renovated space in Klawock for a few months. The state originally planned on moving in February 1, 2016. City of Craig staff still intends to arrange for Craig Police Department officers to make electronic appearances to the new court space in order to avoid making multiple trips to Klawock each week. We had focused initially on constructing a small building in the back parking lot of the Craig PD, and while that is still an option it seems more likely at this point that staff will elect to remodel part of the old clinic building to meet this need.

The December 31 revenue and expense reports are available for the January 21, 2016 council meeting.

The sales tax for the summer months ending September 30 were down 10% from last year. The revenue for the second quarter will not be available till January 31. The initial returns that have been submitted are reporting less receipts than last year. The city did receive the annual fish tax. The amount of \$342,739.21 which is \$28,000 more than last year.

The departments' expenditure budgets are stressed this year. There have been some large unexpected needs this year such as wood boiler, fire equipment, and the totem park upgrade.

The ice house continues to need extensive maintenance but on a positive note the revenue for the ice sales is 40% higher than in past years. The revenue to date is \$93,144 and the expenses are about the same.

- Overhaul main lap pool injection pump.

- Replace front entrance steps to city gym.
- We spent the last two weeks of December cleaning, repairing, and streamlining the PPF main shop. We enclosed the office space, sorted through tools, equipment and materials. We consolidated and grouped all inventory parts and supplies. We did not complete an actual inventory due to time constraints. With the organization and consolidation, we do know what we have on hand and can verify whether we have an item before purchasing a new one. This should eliminate buying new parts that we already have on hand, due to disorganization. At some point we will complete an actual inventory.

Projects currently in progress:

- Cemetery Cross replacement. Red Casteel has completed assembling all the crosses. We are grateful for his contribution of time and effort. All markers have been engraved with names. Material for the anchors is ordered.
- Removal of "Widow Makers" and leaning trees at Sandy Beach access and trail (weather permitting)
- We installed an LED bulb in a fixture at the aquatic center for testing. This test replaces a 1000 watt HPS and associated components with a 60 watt LED bulb. This test is for looking at lighting solutions for the upcoming aquatic center renovation.

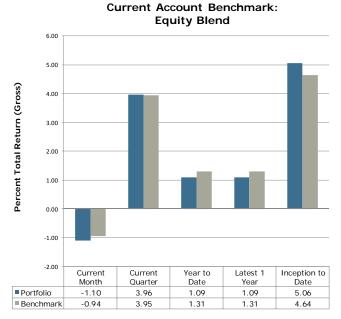

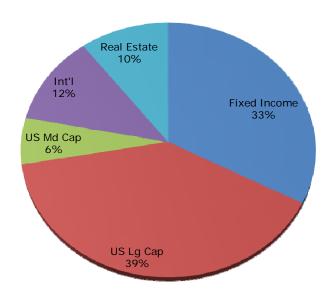

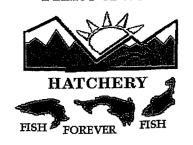

Brood Year (BY) 15 eggs hatched in late November. The hatch trays and mortality have been removed. The newly hatched fry will remain on chilled recirculation water until April for emergence from incubators in mid-May. If the ambient water temperature gets cold enough this year we will use it (<2C). The past several years it has not been cold enough.

BY 14 smolts are currently being tagged. 30,000 fish from the PSN and 30,000 fish from Coffman Cove release will be tagged. Approximately 9,000 fish have been tagged and tagging should be finished by February 1.

At their December 2015 board meeting the SSRAA directors voted in favor to assume operations of the Klawock and Port Saint Nicholas Hatcheries. The tentative take over date is July 1, 2016 to coincide with fiscal year 2017 at which point POWHA will dissolve. POWHA employees will remain in their current positions as SSRAA employees. Until then POWHA will operate as usual. The next SSRAA board meeting is January 22 at The Landing conference room.

RE: Addendum to Contract with RP Kinney & Associates, Phase IV Paving

Attached you will find a contract modification proposal from RP Kinney Associates, Inc. to complete design and engineering services for Phase IV of the Craig Community Street Improvement Project.

In 2012 the city awarded a design contract to RP Kinney Associates for design and engineering services on city streets for Phase IV. A long delay followed the company's Phase IV design work as the city worked through the construction portion of Phase III. When staff restarted work on Phase IV design, additional design services were needed before the project was ready for public review and bidding by general contractors. In addition, staff notified RP Kinney that it would modify the scope of the design work to delete some tasks and add others. RP Kinney then presented the city with a written proposal to complete the design and bidding work on a time and materials basis, for an amount not to exceed \$30,500. The city's original contract with RP Kinney underran their bid amount by about \$5,500.

Among the tasks staff proposes to add to the engineer's scope of work is a public review process where property owners along the streets proposed for upgrade and paving will have an opportunity to review the street design at a public meeting with city staff, in order to gather comments on the design and address any design concerns before the bid process.

The additional design and engineering work is needed to prepare the project for bid and construction this year.

Funding for the project comes from two grant awards to the city. The sum total of the two grant sources is approximately \$900,000.

I expect that the eventual bid price to complete the work will exceed the grant funding available. Staff will ask the council at a subsequent meeting to prioritize the street segments so that the higher prioritized streets are upgraded first.

Recommendation

Move to approve the contract addendum with RP Kinney Associates in an amount not to exceed \$30,500.

Please reference our contract to complete a design for Craig Community Streets Phase IV and email correspondence from Mr. Ron McIntosh dated November 7, 2015. The purpose of this letter is to request a contract modification in order to complete the City required changes and to add the three new segments to the design package. The following is a summery of the proposed changes.

The following road segments will be deleted from the project design package.

- Thompson Road
- Float Plane Dock Parking Lot
- Night Court/Windy Way

The following segments will be added to the final package. These segments will require additional survey work to be completed. We assume to complete the work while our survey crew is on Prince of Wales Island for other projects.

- Main Street from 7th to 9th Street
- Water Tower Road between Hamilton and Oceanview Drive
- Intersection improvements at Beach road and First Street

The cul-de-sacs on the project will be increased to 28 feet. It appears that additional right-of-way may be required. Right-of-way acquisition services are currently not included in our contract. It is recommended that any site control requirements be completed prior to bidding the project.

The city has directed deletion of the majority of the curb and gutter on the project, which will reduce cost, but it will allow drainage to sheet flow off the roadway into adjacent surrounding properties. We did not include any costs associated with considering the offsite conveyance of drainage through or impacts to the adjacent properties. We assume that the City of Craig will work with affected property owners directly to address any existing or future drainage issues associated with the deletion of the curb and gutters.

Rodney P. Kinney Associates, Inc. (RPKA) will provide the City pre-final construction plans, specifications, and engineers estimate (PS&E) for review to ensure all required additions and deletions are addressed to the City's satisfaction. Upon conformation from the City of approval we will finalize the PS&E package for bidding.

RPKA will complete the project bidding as included in our original contract fee proposal. We request that the City of Craig provide RPKA with the City's approved construction contract and standard bidding documents that we can use to prepare and solicit the project.

FEE

We propose to complete the work outlined in this letter and Mr. Ron McIntosh's email dated November 7, 2015, on a time and materials basis not to exceed for \$30,500 without written approval.

SCHEDULE

RPKA will complete the work once approved, as soon as possible. We understand that the City would like to bid the work early in 2016.
